3<sup>rd</sup> Party Request to Initiate Rulemaking Revised Regulation 37-Arkansas Nutrient Water Quality Trading Regulations APCEC Docket No. 18-001-R

Thank you for the opportunity to submit the following comments on the revised draft Regulation No. 37 proposed by four cities located in Northwest Arkansas (Fayetteville, Springdale, Rogers and Bentonville). This revised draft regulation proposes to establish a statewide water quality trading program for nutrients. If adopted, this will be the very first trading program for the State of Arkansas.

### **Nutrient Water Quality Trading Advisory Panel**

In enacting the law authorizing the Nutrient Water Quality Trading Program, the Arkansas Legislature created the Nutrient Water Quality Trading Advisory Panel (Advisory Panel). This Advisory Panel was established by the legislature to advise the Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) and the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission (ANRC) "regarding the desirability, design, and operation of nutrient water quality trading programs" and to advise the Arkansas Pollution Control and Ecology Commission (Commission) and the ANRC "regarding the promulgation of regulations involving nutrient water quality trading programs (emphasis added)." According to the law, the Commission cannot initiate a rulemaking proceeding to adopt a nutrient water quality trading program unless the proposed regulation has been recommended by the Advisory Panel or the Panel has been given at least 60 days notice of the proposed rulemaking.<sup>2</sup>

The Northwest Arkansas Nutrient Trading Research and Advisory Group (NANTRAG) is made up of the four Northwest Arkansas cities initiating this third-party rulemaking (Fayetteville, Springdale, Rogers, and Bentonville). As noted in its initial Petition to Initiate Rulemaking filed with the Commission, the first proposal was submitted by NANTRAG to the Advisory Panel for review and ultimately the Advisory Panel voted to recommend that the Commission initiate rulemaking.<sup>3</sup>

The rulemaking was initiated by the Commission on January 26, 2018.<sup>4</sup> A public comment period was provided, and as a result of the numerous public comments received on its draft proposal, NANTRAG filed a revised version of Regulation No. 37 with the Commission and asked the Commission to provide a supplemental public comment period giving the public an opportunity to consider NANTRAG's revisions.<sup>5</sup> The supplemental public comment period ends at 4:30 on November 5, 2018.

Although NANTRAG revised Regulation No. 37 and submitted it to the public for additional comment, it did not submit the revised version to the Advisory Panel for review. This raises the question, "does NANTRAG have to submit its revised draft regulation to the Advisory Panel once the rulemaking has been initiated by the Commission?" As noted above, one of the Advisory Panel's two roles is advising

the Commission "regarding the promulgation of regulations involving nutrient water quality trading." But obviously the Advisory Panel cannot advise the Commission if it is not given the opportunity to see the regulation proposed for adoption. If rulemakings can proceed without any opportunity for the Advisory Panel to make a recommendation on a third party's revisions to the proposals the Panel has recommended, then the Advisory Panel's review and recommendations on the initial rulemaking would be rendered meaningless. This cannot be what was intended by the State Legislature in creating the Advisory Panel.

Failing to submit the revised regulation to the Advisory Panel is a procedural defect and appears to violate the spirit, if not the letter of the law. Please correct this procedural defect by requiring NANTRAG to submit its revised regulation to the Advisory Panel for a recommendation prior to proceeding any further with this rulemaking.

### **Other Comments**

In the event that NANTRAG's revisions are ultimately considered by the Commission without any additional opportunity to comment, I offer the following comments on the revised draft Regulation No. 37:

A. Excessive nutrients (phosphorus and nitrogen) can cause water pollution. Increased nutrients contribute to the growth of algae. An algal bloom can lead to reduced dissolved oxygen, which is harmful to aquatic life. Algal blooms also can lead to the release of toxins, which make water unsafe for human contact. Therefore, a program designed to reduce nutrients should benefit Arkansas' water bodies. However, nutrient trading programs are complex. And creating a nutrient trading program without first having numeric water quality-based criteria for nutrients is putting the cart before the horse.

- B. Please respond to the following general comments in the Rulemaking's Response to Comments:
  - 1. This draft regulation consists of 7 pages for an entirely new statewide trading program, which is unlike any program previously administered by ADEQ. Missing from this trading program is the maximum instream nutrient concentrations that will protect water quality and designated uses (either numeric nutrient water quality criteria or the instream target loads established through a total maximum daily load). Basic numeric nutrient water quality criteria needed for the successful implementation of a program intended to protect and maintain water quality and avoid hot spots (locally high concentrations of nutrients) are absent. This lack of numeric nutrient criteria in Arkansas is a fundamental flaw in being able to track and measure the effectiveness of this proposed trading program.
  - The baseline requirements for projects generating credits by point sources are the nutrient limits included in NPDES permits. Such limits are not water quality based effluent limits. As such, they are not proper "baseline requirements" for generating credits by point sources.
  - Terms and phrases critical to the implementation of a water quality based nutrient trading program remain undefined, including "watershed," "offsets," "unacceptable localized adverse

- effect on water quality," "baseline requirements" for projects generating credits by non-point source activity," and "significant adverse impact," etc.).
- 4. Although the proposed revisions add some clarity regarding the review of the Director's decision on applications for nutrient credit generating projects, important aspects of the administrative procedures still are unclear. For example, how does one appeal the review of an application involving nonpoint source nutrient credit-generating projects submitted to the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission, can the use of credits to offset nutrient permit limits incorporated into an NPDES permit be appealed as part of the final permitting decision, is the Director's decision to extend the term of a nutrient credit generating project appealable, and, if so, how, and if the amount of an offset allowed from a credit must be modified as a result of changes to baseline requirements, how and when is that modification accomplished and is that decision appealable?
- No dischargers should be allowed to use pollution credits as offsets for nutrient discharges to waterbodies identified as Outstanding Resource Waters in Reg. 2.203 (Antidegradation Policy). (For example, see AR0036811, AR0035459, AR0020231.)
- 6. Protecting public health and welfare is a fundamental mandate of environmental regulation. Section 4 of the proposed regulation addresses trades in watersheds where public drinking water supplies are located. Specifically, the credit generating project has to be located in the same watershed as a reservoir that is designated as a public drinking water supply. This is an important provision for protecting public health and welfare. But, to adequately protect public drinking water supplies, the regulation should be revised to add that the credit generating project must be located upstream of any public drinking water supply designated by the Department of Health because a credit generating project located downstream of a public drinking water supply will not protect the drinking water supply from increased nutrients. Also, no justification has been provided for limiting the protection of drinking water supplies to only reservoirs. Further, because there should be no adverse impact to drinking water supplies from nutrient trading, Section 4 (A)(4) should be re-written to state, "Evidence demonstrating that the use of offsets will have no adverse impact upon a drinking water supply source designated by the Arkansas Department of Health." Finally, there is no Appendix A (referenced in Section 4 (B)) attached to the draft Regulation for the public to review for purposes of providing comments.
- 7. There appear to be no clear requirements for a nexus between credit generating projects and their use as offsets in NPDES permits. The regulation must provide a requirement for a nexus between credit generating projects and their use as offsets in NPDES permits.
- C. I believe the following are accurate statements necessitating changes to the draft regulation. If you agree, please revise the regulation to ensure that water quality is protected. If you disagree with any of the statements below, please explain why in the Response to Comment.
  - Water quality based numeric criteria establish instream concentrations protective of water quality and designated uses.

- Arkansas has not adopted water quality based numeric nutrient criteria for phosphorus or nitrogen.
- A nutrient trading program should ensure that water quality is maintained and protected and hotspots are not created.
- 4) The impact of nutrient trading on water quality cannot be meaningfully quantified in the absence of established numeric water quality-based criteria for nutrients or instream target loads for nutrients established through a total maximum daily load (TMDL) that is protective of water quality and designated uses.
- 5) If a nutrient credit purchaser buys credits from a downstream generator, the trade could result in a localized increase in nutrients in the segment between the buyer and the generator/seller.
- 6) Currently, NPDES Permit limits in Arkansas for total phosphorus (TP) are not water quality-based effluent limits.
- 7) Currently, NPDES permit limits for TP are technology derived limits based on the "generally accepted scientific knowledge and engineering practice in consideration of the technical information on TP treatment capability of the MBR treatment system." Pages 7- 8 of Fact Sheet, Permit Number AR0022292 Permit.
- 8) Currently, NPDES permit limits for TP in Arkansas are significantly greater than the concentrations at which aquatic shifts are observed due to TP (See Final Report to Governors from the Joint Study Committee and Scientific Professionals, dated December 19, 2016- a report on Oklahoma's Scenic Rivers).
- 9) For projects generating credits by point sources, a baseline for trading set as the NPDES permit limit for TP would set the baseline for trading at what technology can achieve and not on numeric water quality criteria.
- 10) Baselines for projects generating credits should be derived from and consistent with numeric nutrient water quality standards.
- D. Please provide answers to the following questions in the Rulemaking's Response to Comments:
  - 1. Shouldn't the proposed regulation require any credit used as an offset to be produced during the same time period that a permit limit is actually applicable? If not, why not?
  - 2. Does this proposed regulation potentially allow credits to be generated in a watershed that is different from the watershed where the credits can be applied? If so, how would trades involving different watersheds maintain and protect the water quality? How would trades involving different watersheds avoid the generation of nutrient hot spots?
  - 3. Without water quality based numeric nutrient criteria that establish maximum in-stream concentrations for protecting water quality and designated uses, how can a nutrient trading program ensure that water quality is protected and maintained as a result of the trades?
  - 4. Without water quality based numeric nutrient criteria, how can a nutrient trading program prevent the development of nutrient hot spots as a result of the trades?

5. What methodologies are expected to effectively track the generation and use of credits in NPDES permits, and how is the offset used in an NPDES permit reported on discharge monitoring reports?

E. NANTRAG's revised Regulation No. 37 includes a "General Provisions" section. The General Provisions include a subsection on fees, which designates ADEQ as the party responsible for developing a user fee schedule "by calculating the reasonable costs to the Department of implementing and enforcing the nutrient water quality trading" program. What may be reasonable costs for administering such a program, is not likely to be an easy calculation for ADEQ. Since fiscal year 2015, the agency has undergone a significant and costly reorganization, revenues and expenditures appear to be out of balance, and the Office of Water Quality seems to have a high staff turnover in the Inspection, Enforcement, and Permitting Branches. Taken together, these facts and circumstances suggest why the Agency could expect to encounter some difficulty in calculating the reasonable costs to administer a new Nutrient Trading Program, most likely to be housed in the Office of Water Quality.

The currently identifiable fiscally related trends discussed below show how the sand is shifting so as to offer only a precarious foundation on which to construct new user fees. And the problems associated with calculating reasonable user fees to support a new statewide Nutrient Trading program are compounded by the fact that this proposed trading program is one with which ADEQ has no experience.

### **Significant and Costly Reorganization**

Six new high-paying, high-level management positions have been added to ADEQ's payroll since 2015.<sup>7</sup> In 2015, the Agency's senior management included a Director, Chief Deputy Director, Deputy Director - Land Resources, Legal Policy Advisor (General Counsel), and 12 Division Chiefs. (See attached ADEQ Organization Chart dated 02/23/15.) In early 2016, the Agency was reorganized into five Offices; three regulatory divisions-the Office of Air Quality, the Office of Water Quality, and the Office of Land Resources and two administrative divisions-the Office of Operations and Outreach and the Office of Law and Policy.<sup>8</sup> According to ADEQ's 2018 appropriation,<sup>9</sup> the Department has retained, and then added to, the senior management positions existing in 2015 by creating and funding the following six new director positions (with their current salaries):

- Deputy Director of Air (\$111,652.94);
- Deputy Director of Water Quality (\$99,910.93);
- Deputy Director-Office of Operations (\$99,674.64);

- Director of Enterprise Services (\$94,893.55);
- ADEQ Director of Information Tech (\$92,675.23); and
- Energy Office Director (\$89,698.34).

In addition to reorganizing and adding a new layer of management to the payroll, the number of employees making over \$85,000 has more than tripled in the last three years. In 2015, five employees of ADEQ made over \$85,000/year (the director, chief deputy director, deputy director, and two career employees). In 2018, 16 employees now make over \$85,000/year.<sup>10</sup>

Despite adding more upper level management positions and increasing salaries at the top staff levels, the overall agency's budget has remained flat. So how did the agency pay for the additions to management and increased salaries? It appears that a large number of authorized positions occupied by those who perform the agency's work on the ground went unfilled during 2017 and 2018. The cost savings from these unfilled positions likely offset the salaries for the new management positions and higher staff salaries. The cost savings for the 85 unfilled positions as of January 1, 2017 amounted to \$2,877,134 (see attached Unfilled Positions List for 2017). The cost savings for the 85 unfilled positions as of January 1, 2018 totaled \$3,530,995 (see attached Unfilled Positions List for 2018).

Unfortunately, these millions of dollars in salary savings, by itself, may not be enough to cover the increasing payroll for the State Operations fund at ADEQ. Even with the cost savings from the unfilled positions, ADEQ anticipated the need to transfer money from one fund into another in order to meet the FY 2018 and 2019 State Operations or HMA appropriations. ADEQ has three funds from which the majority of ADEQ staff are paid. These funds are: 1) the State Operations fund (HMA); 2). the Federal Operations fund (FYP); and 3) the Fee Trust Fund (TPE). The Fee Fund is where permit fees are collected for "Air, Water, and Solid Waste permitting, monitoring and inspecting activities."12 In other words, the Fee Fund pays for the staff who support the Air, Water, and Solid Waste permit programs. I believe the Federal Operations fund pays for staff working on federal grant activities. And the State Operations fund (the fund needing more money) pays for other staff who support "general operations" and for matching federal grants. The primary funding source for the State Operations fund is general revenue. In fiscal years 2015 through 2017, ADEQ certified the four funding sources for the State Operations (HMA) fund as the previous year's fund balance, general revenue, a grant from the Oil & Gas Commission (\$340,000), and miscellaneous income. But, and this may be due to the new management and increased salaries mentioned above, in FY 2018 and FY 2019 ADEQ certified that it had enough anticipated revenues to fund the appropriation by adding another funding source to the other sources of income mentioned in prior years; that is, a \$500,000 transfer from the healthier Fee Fund. (See attached Certification of Income for fiscal years 2015-2019.) These transfers from the Fee Fund may suggest an anticipated shortfall in the State

Operations fund without the transfers. And this may be a small warning alarm for payroll problems ahead.

### **Agency Productivity**

Since 2015, the agency has added a whole new management layer while still keeping all the other senior management positions that existed in 2015. But most of the staff who occupied the senior management positions in 2015 are no longer at ADEQ or serving in the same capacity. The only person in the Director's Office at the beginning of 2015<sup>13</sup> (other than the Director) who is still at the agency is the Legal Policy Advisor, who became the Air Division Chief and then the Director of Air Quality. In early 2015, ADEQ's other senior managers included the 12 Division Chiefs over Air, Water, Hazardous Waste, Solid Waste, Regulated Storage Tanks, Mining, Fiscal, Legal, Public Outreach and Assistance, Management Services, Computer Services, and Tech Services. Because of one vacancy (Air), there were 11 division chiefs in early 2015. Of those 11 division chiefs, one still remains today over her original division (Tech Services), eight are no longer with ADEQ, one division chief who was over Hazardous Waste is now in charge of the Tire Accountability Program and, I understand, the last division chief (Mining) is in a state of transition to another position. I believe this is an unprecedented turnover in senior management at ADEQ. Although there are no longer any divisions, the Division Chief positions were not eliminated and have been refilled (except for maybe the Solid Waste Division Chief position, which is listed as one of the unfilled positions for 2018).

Since 2015, other changes have occurred in ADEQ's work force. Positions have been added,<sup>14</sup> agency positions have been eliminated,<sup>15</sup> positions have been left unfilled, and position titles have been changed.<sup>16</sup> This overwhelming transformation was intended to "achieve multiple internal efficiencies-including resource savings, streamlining work processes...." So how is ADEQ doing with its resource savings and agency productivity?

### Expenditures + Salaries - Revenues =?

It appears that over the last two years ADEQ has spent significantly more than it has brought in. Between FY 2015 and FY 2018, ADEQ has gone from having a positive balance (\$2,289,356) to a

negative balance (-\$7,064,301) based on total expenditures (expenditures<sup>18</sup> plus salaries<sup>19</sup>) and revenues<sup>20</sup>.

### FY 2015

Revenues - \$49,303,833

Expenditures + Salaries = Total Expenditures

\$25,755,228 + \$21,259,249 = \$47,014,477

Revenues - Total Expenditures =

\$49,303,833 - \$47,014,477 = \$2,289,356

### FY 2016

Revenues - \$45,264,985

Expenditures + Salaries = Total Expenditures

\$24,686,620 + \$20,549,507 = \$45,236,127

Revenues - Total Expenditures =

\$45,264,985 - \$45,236,127 = \$28,858

### FY 2017

Revenues - \$39,816,717

Expenditures + Salaries = Total Expenditures

\$22,216,814 + \$20,549,507 = \$42,766,321

Revenues - Total Expenditures =

\$39,816,717 - \$42,766,321 = (-\$2,949,604)

### FY 2018

Revenues - \$51,558,364

Expenditures + Salaries = Total Expenditures

\$37,524,682 + \$21,097,983 = \$58,622,665

Revenues - Total Expenditures =

\$51,558,364 - \$58,622,655 = (-\$7,064,301)

The above calculations show that ADEQ's revenues and total expenditures are out of balance. And except for the Energy Office merger, the FY 2018 negative balance would have been much worse. In FY 2018 two new revenue sources totaling \$4,591,645 appeared. The "Inter-Agency Federal Revenue Transfers" amount was \$3,018,312 and the "Inter-Agency Transfers" amount was \$1,573,333.<sup>21</sup> These new revenues "were transferred as part of the merger of the Arkansas Energy Office and ADEQ."<sup>22</sup> Without the Energy Office merger, the revenues for FY 2018 would have been lower (\$46,966719), which, in turn, would have increased the negative balance for FY 2018 to a --\$11,655,936.

### **Permit Fees**

According to the Revenues listed on the State's Transparency website, ADEQ collected \$773,094 fewer pollution control permit fees in FY 2018 than in FY 2015. The pollution control permit fees reported as revenues for fiscal years 2015 – 2018<sup>23</sup> show the following amounts collected for each year:

2015 - \$11,386,322.80

2016 - \$11,194,602.46

2017 - \$10,737,976.50

2018 - \$10,653,228.90

Clearly there is a downward trend in permit fees collected between FY 2015 and FY 2018. And given the most recent changes to Regulation 9 in 2016, it does not appear that this loss in revenue can be attributable to the elimination of certain types of permits or cutting the costs of permit fees. One possible explanation for this loss of revenue may be related to agency productivity.

### **Enforcement**

Using the Section 38 Reports and the Legal CAO database, a review of enforcement action reveals a clear downward trend in enforcement between FY 2015 and FY 2018. By reviewing revenue data from the State's Transparency website and SPL Comparison Reports, a similar downward trend in collecting penalties between FY 2015 and FY 2018 also is revealed. The information collected follows:

### Impacts to Office of Water Quality

Are there any changes in the Office of Water Quality which might impact user fees for the Nutrient Water Quality Trading Program? A quick comparison of the Office of Water Quality's current Organizational Chart on ADEQ's website to one from 2015 (attached) reveals that between 2015 and 2018 the Office lost two inspector positions and one enforcement analyst. These positions appear to be the type the agency might need to help support a new program such as nutrient trading.

There also has been notable turnover of personnel within the Inspection, Enforcement, and Permitting Branches, which can affect the Office's overall productivity. Half of the Office of Water Quality's 20 inspectors are new since 2015, only three of the eight enforcement analysts were at ADEQ in 2015 (two are new and three positions are vacant). One of the two enforcement coordinators is new since 2015. Two of the three engineer supervisors in the Permits Branch are new supervisors since 2015, five of the 15 staff engineers are new since 2015 and there are two engineering position vacancies, leaving only eight staff engineers (slightly more than half of the engineering staff) with substantial permitting experience at ADEQ.

Approximately one half of all the inspectors, enforcement analysts, and permit engineers are new hires since 2015. This kind of turnover cannot be desirable. A revolving door affects the workload of the staff who stay with the agency. Also, there are costs to an agency associated with routinely having to advertise, hire, and train new employees. And experienced staff, being trained, are usually more productive than new employees- so it would seem preferable to try to retain them.

A frequently changing workforce might be a concern for those users whose fees will be supporting the staff in the new trading program.

### Wasteful Spending<sup>25</sup>

The agency's reorganization was intended to save resources. But, as an aside, I believe a review of some of the acquisitions/expenditures in 2017 illustrate that ADEQ is no standard bearer for safeguarding limited state resources. The sampling I provide, though small in amount, cumulatively suggest a potential problem related to wasteful spending. For example, ADEQ has spent state funds on party supplies. One receipt shows a purchase the day before Valentine's Day of ten "Glitter Heart Foam Pans" and 15 "Sweethearts" for "Town Hall Meeting supplies." (That would be the Town Hall meetings that are NOT open to the public.) Another example is the purchase of three flags with the state credit card (totaling \$234.69) for the 2017 Veterans Day Celebration at the Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality. 26

Then there were the table cloths. On February 9, 2017, ADEQ purchased six rectangular table cloths (\$52.38). On September 21, 2017, the agency purchased six round table cloths (\$60). And in June the agency rented (yes, rented and then gave back) seven table cloths, costing the state \$61.60. In seven months, ADEQ purchased 12 table cloths and rented seven. What is ADEQ doing with all those table cloths?

And what resources are saved by spending over \$120 on a decorative pot and plant to be closeted away in the Director's Office - a corner office on the sixth floor, access to which is strictly controlled? There are more examples, but I will stop here with one final illustration highlighting what appears to be the agency's troubling indifference to using proper internal accounting controls to adequately safeguard State assets and to deter and detect fraud, purchasing errors, and pilfering. The review of acquisitions/expenditures showed purchases made for ADEQ that were shipped directly to an employee's home rather than to the agency. This occurred six times between February and October 2017. Twice items were purchased using the State's credit card. In the other four instances the employee was reimbursed with state funds. The items purchased totaled \$381.41.

Individually these purchases are small, but such careless expenditures repeated regularly over time seem to suggest a disregard for safeguarding scarce state funds and a lack of fiscal responsibility. And, from an auditing perspective, these purchases may point to bigger problems.

### **Concluding Remarks**

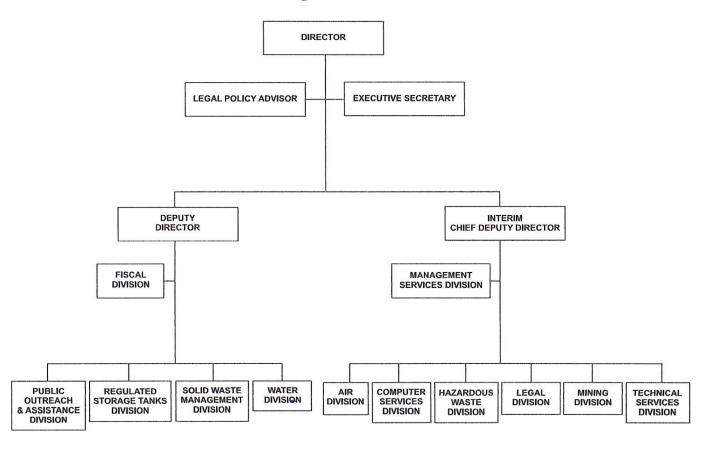
This review is not intended to be exhaustive, but raises the question, "how can this agency calculate reasonable user fees to fund, staff, and house an entirely new administrative program when it is undergoing a titanic transformation, its revenues and expenditures appear to be wildly out of balance, and the agency simply has no experience with trading programs?" Creating a trading program before understanding the reasonable staffing requirements and costs to effectively administer and enforce such a program is much too premature.

In conclusion, it is important to note that I support the concept of nutrient trading as a tool for providing economic incentives to reduce nutrients by those sources that can most easily achieve the reductions. But in the absence of numeric nutrient water quality criteria, I do not think the mechanisms needed to allow, complete, and enforce a complex trading program can be sufficiently charted. Other commenters previously suggested a regional pilot program to address the regional issues in Northwest Arkansas. Such a pilot program could go a long way toward informing the Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality, the Arkansas Pollution Control and Ecology Commission, the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission, and the public about the mechanisms, safeguards, and procedures required to implement a successful trading program that is protective of water quality and its designated uses. Accordingly, I ask that this regulation not be adopted by the Commission at this time.

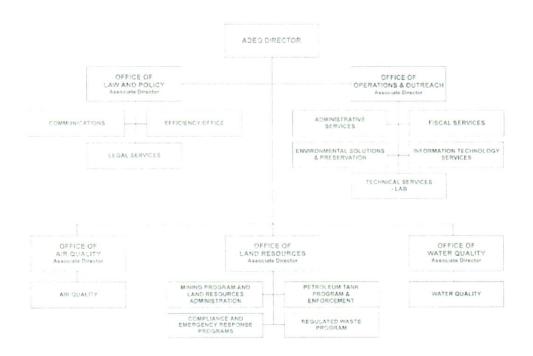

### **Agency Commentary**

The Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) is undergoing a reorganization that is designed to achieve multiple internal efficiencies-including consolidating resource savings, streamlining work processes, improving response time with Arkansans, and increasing inter-divisional cooperation. ADEQ is utilizing our current work force to its maximum efficiency and evaluating whether to fill open positions. As part of our reorganization, we have realigned the twelve divisions in the agency into three program divisions and two support divisions. The three program divisions are the Office of Air Quality, the Office of Water Quality, and the Office of Land Resources. The two support offices are the Office of Law and Policy and the Office of Operations and Outreach. ADEQ's reorganization is part of an overall plan to be

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### Analysis of Budget Request

Appropriation: 2TP - ADEQ - State Operations

Funding Sources: HMA - ADEQ Fund

The Agency utilizes this appropriation for the general operations of various programs and for matching of federal grants. This appropriation is funded by general revenue, and other non-revenue receipt deposits along with contributions from other agencies.

ADEQ is charged with the duty to issue permits to prevent the discharge of wastes into waters of the state. In conjunction with drilling activities, the Agency issues permits for land application activities, reserve pits, and storage facilities associated with salt-water injection wells. The Agency also performs site inspections and responds to citizen complaints.

Base Level Regular Salaries and Personal Services Matching include the continuation of the previously authorized 2017 Salaries and Career Service Payments for eligible employees. Personal Services Matching includes the monthly contribution for State employee's health insurance for a total State match per budgeted employee of \$420 per month. Base Level salaries and matching do not include appropriation for a Cost of Living Adjustment or Merit Pay Increases. The Base Level salary of unclassified positions reflects the FY17 line item maximum plus the previously authorized 2016 1% Cost of Living Adjustment authorized by Act 1007 (3 (8)) of 2015.

The Agency Request is for Base Level of \$5,161,883 for FY18 and \$5,168,666 for FY19 with \$4,633,925 in FY18 and \$4,818,666 in FY19 in general revenue funding.

Subsequent to Agency's initial Budget Request, the Office of Personnel Management and Agency personnel evaluated the Agency's position usage and ongoing staffing needs. The Executive Recommendation, in addition to providing for the Agency Request, reflects the reduction of one (1) ADEQ Enforcement Coordinator (C120), one (1) ADEQ Inspector (C118), and one (1) Administrative Specialist II (C109) position based on the personnel evaluation and the reduction of General Revenue Funding of \$129,562 each year of the biennium.

### **Analysis of Budget Request**

Appropriation: 2TQ - ADEQ - Federal Operations

Funding Sources: FYP - Federal Funds

ADEQ utilizes this appropriation for the federal portion of program activities. Federal funding is received from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the US Department of Interior. The Agency operates under the grants with varying amounts of state matching requirements.

Base Level Regular Salaries and Personal Services Matching include the continuation of the previously authorized 2017 Salaries and Career Service Payments for eligible employees. Personal Services Matching includes the monthly contribution for State employee's health insurance for a total State match per budgeted employee of \$420 per month. Base Level salaries and matching do not include appropriation for a Cost of Living Adjustment or Merit Pay Increases.

Base Level is \$9,187,309 in FY18 and \$9,189,895 in FY19.

The Agency's Change Level requests totaling \$270,000 in FY18 and \$280,000 in FY19 reflect the following:

- Reallocation of \$20,000 Conference & Travel Expenses and \$79,000 Professional Fees to Grants and Aid and Operating Expenses to align
  with Agency needs.
- Capital Outlay increase of \$270,000 in FY18 and \$280,000 in FY19 to replace equipment and vehicles.

The Executive Recommendation provides for the Agency Request for Capital Outlay to replace aging, high mileage vehicles in accordance with A.C.A. §22-8-201 et seq., Automobile and Pickup Truck Acquisition Act, which establishes guidelines for automobile replacement.

Subsequent to Agency's initial Budget Request, the Office of Personnel Management and Agency personnel evaluated the Agency's position usage and ongoing staffing needs. The Executive Recommendation reflects the reduction of one (1) Chemist (C117) position based on the personnel evaluation.

### **Analysis of Budget Request**

Appropriation: 2TX - Fee Administration

Funding Sources: TPE - ADEQ Fee Trust Fund

Act 817 of 1983 (A.C.A. §8-1-103), as amended, authorized the Agency to establish and collect permit fees for Air, Water, and Solid Waste permitting, monitoring and inspecting activities. During the 79th General Assembly, various limits on permits were included, with the Agency revising the rate structures. The fees, as established by the Agency in accordance with stipulations set out in the Act, were increased effective in October of 1993. Further, the Federal Clean Air Act has required a permit fee system to cover the costs of compliance with this law.

Base Level Regular Salaries and Personal Services Matching include the continuation of the previously authorized 2017 Salaries and Career Service Payments for eligible employees. Personal Services Matching includes the monthly contribution for State employee's health insurance for a total State match per budgeted employee of \$420 per month. Base Level salaries and matching do not include appropriation for a Cost of Living Adjustment or Merit Pay Increases.

Base Level is \$13,187,462 in FY18 and \$13,192,136 in FY19.

The Agency's Change Level requests totaling \$382,759 each year reflect the following:

- Reallocation of \$25,000 in FY18 from Professional and Administrative Fees to Capital Outlay in order to purchase a large scanner. This
  request is located in the Agency's IT Plan.
- Capital Outlay increase of \$20,000 each year to purchase equipment.
- Regular Salaries and Personal Services Matching of \$362,759 each year for the restoration of three (3) ADEQ Deputy Director (N908) positions from Growth Pool.

Subsequent to Agency's initial Budget Request, the Office of Personnel Management and Agency personnel evaluated the Agency's position usage and ongoing staffing needs. The Executive Recommendation in addition to providing for the Agency Request reflects the reduction of four (4) Administrative Specialist II (C109), one (1) Grants Analyst (C117), one (1) ADEQ Enforcement Coordinator (C120), one (1) ADEQ Enforcement Analyst (C119), and one (1) Administrative Specialist III (C109).

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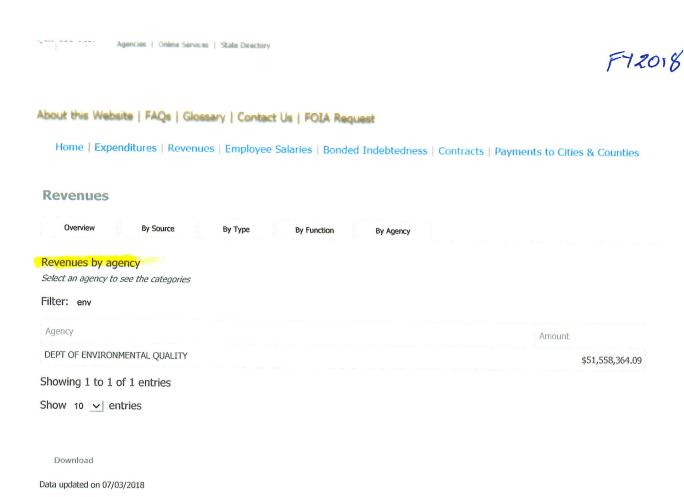
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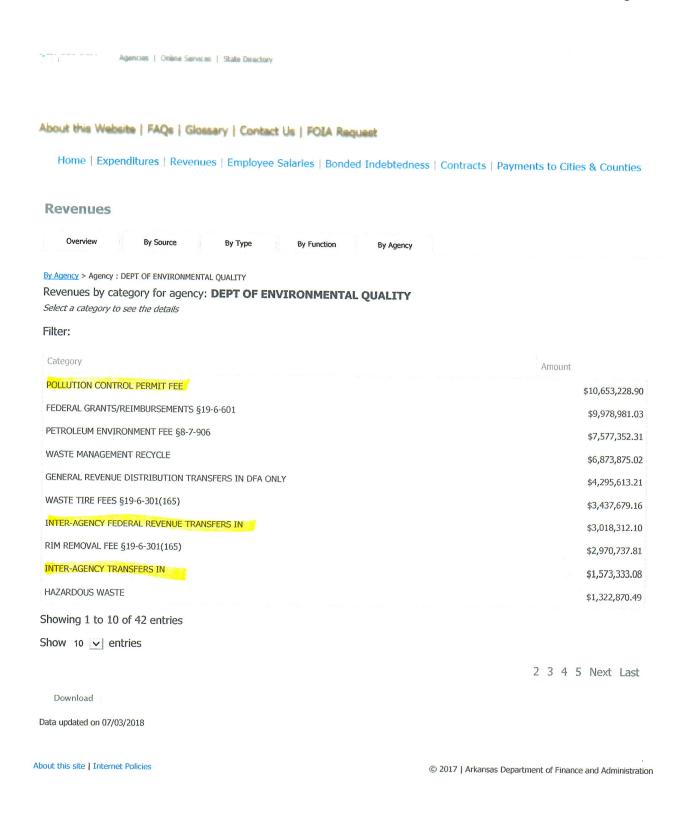
